Associate Professor Hadrian Djajadikerta Associate Dean Research School of Business and Law Innovation is the key to an organisation's competitive advantage and innovative ideas in an organisation can emanate from various sources. They can be from individual employees, leaders, consultants and even newcomers to the organisation.

However, do organisations, especially large service organisations actively manage innovation, and how do they do so? How do these organisations manage their innovative endeavours in response to their external environments? How do they create organisational climates where innovation can thrive?

This seminar brings together findings about innovation in five large Australian service organisations. In the first organisation, a government agency, we examined the roles of job design, organisational social support and individual proactivity on individual employees' innovative work behaviour.

The research on the other four organisations (a Police Academy, a Bank, a University and a Public/Private hospital) examined the effect of the external and internal environments on their pursuit of innovation, and was the outcome of a PhD research supervision.

Denise Gengatharen is an Associate Professor in the field of Information Systems, Project Management and Innovation and is currently the Associate Dean, Commerce in SBL. Denise's PhD thesis examined the role of regional internet trading platforms for small and medium enterprises in Western Australia. This has been extended in recent years to include the examination of innovation in organisations in Western Australia. Her other research interests include the role of project management in today's economy and positive education in Higher Education Institutions.
