More recently she lectured and conducted research work at the UNISA (University of South Africa) from 2014 to 2018.


Dunn-Moses participated in numerous exhibitions since 1999 in South Africa and abroad. She is a performance artist and a painter.

## **Artist Statement**

"The Booty and the Butts show", title was inspired by the "People" magazine cover. These women were photographed while looking seductively over their shoulders with their rear ends as the focal point. The headline on the cover stated "Booty and the Butt, Whose derriere's extraordinaire? More fab bums inside!".

This video installation and performance looks at female body politics and racial identity. Dunn-Moses appreciates the resilience of women, looking at the trauma and desireablity associated with body image. These artworks dramatize the blurry line between vanity and insanity.

This hyperbolic performance is a masquerade of the idealized perceptions related to the female hourglass body shape on social media. Particularly placing emphasis on the current trend of buttock augmentation. She mimics Victorian woman's bustle, emphasising the disparity between the natural shape and the artificial body.
