





Kurungkurl Katitjin, pronounced *koor-ong-kurl cut-it-chin*, is a Noongar phrase meaning 'coming together to learn'. It's also the name of our Centre for Indigenous Australian Education and Research at ECU.

The Centre's mission is to *transform lives and enrich society through meaningful community engagement, innovative student support, high-quality teaching, impactful research and cultural leadership.*

Kurungkurl Katitjin, Edith Cowan University's Centre for Indigenous Australian Education and Research, plays a vital role in assisting the University to meet its commitment to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

We support university-wide activities and programs, as well as activities specific to Australian Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and their cultures.



JOONDALUP

Our Joondalup Campus is located 25km north of Perth and is a short walk or bus ride from the Joondalup Train Station and Lakeside Joondalup, one of the largest shopping centres in Western Australia. Set within beautiful surrounds, including a lake and an outdoor cinema, Joondalup's spacious parkland provides a great place for students to study and relax.

MOUNT LAWLEY

PATHWAYS & COURSES

At ECU, we help Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and their communities to achieve their dreams and aspirations through further education. Our Centre for Indigenous Australian Education and Research, Kurungkurl Katitjin, is committed to assisting students with choosing a university entry pathway and in understanding and adapting to university life.

ABORIGINAL UNIVERSITY READINESS ASSESSMENT (AURA)

Administered by Kurungkurl Katitjin, AURA aims to provide a holistic and personal approach to helping you choose the right pathway to commence your university journey. By establishing important support networks early, the transition for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people into an enabling or undergraduate course at ECU, ensures that you are well supported and well connected right from the start.

ECU's Aboriginal Recruitment Coordinator will discuss your entry options and course application process, including any further assessment of core skills if you don't meet minimum entry requirements.

Kurungkurl Katitjin's Student Success Team will also reach out with tailored support and information once you have made the decision to join us here at ECU.

ABORIGINAL PERFORMANCE COURSE



KURONGKURL KATITJIN STUDENT SUPPORT

ELDERS-IN-RESIDENCE

Kurongkurl Katitjin facilitates unique cultural support across the University through the appointment of our Elder-in-Residence. They provide high level Elder advice and support to ECU's staff, students and community.

Elders bring a wealth of cultural knowledge and experience for our university community that is beyond measure.

STUDENT SUCCESS TEAM

The Kurongkurl Katitjin Student Success team assists Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students to stay on track with their studies and to succeed at university on all three campuses and online.

This includes:

- Supporting study progress, health and wellbeing.
- Assessing personal challenges and developing action plans to overcome them.
- Providing referrals to specialist support services.

NALA KARLA STUDENT ROOMS

The *Nala Karla* rooms are dedicated study and relaxation areas for ECU's Australian Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students and are located on all three campuses.

Joondalup JO 34.142 (Ngoolark, Building 34, Room 142)

South West SW 7.101 (Building 7, Room 101)

Open 7.30am to 11.30pm, 7 days per week.

The rooms provide additional computing and printing facilities, quiet space for tutoring sessions and a social hub to connect as a student community.

Students who identify as Australian Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander will have access to these rooms automatically applied to their student card every semester.

STUDENT RESOURCES

Each semester Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students at ECU are eligible to receive a voucher valued at \$100 that can be used to purchase study related items.

PRINTING CREDIT

Available to all students, printing credit is offered to assist with printing, photocopying and scanning. A credit of \$40 will be loaded onto your student ID card upon application.

ABORIGINAL TUTORIAL AND MENTORING PROGRAM (ATMP)

ATMP covers the cost of engaging tutors to provide one-on-one academic and study skills support over a semester. The program focuses on developing students' self-directed academic learning.

All enrolled Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students at ECU are eligible to apply for this tuition program through Kurongkurl Katitjin.

The hours allocated each semester will be dependent on the student's individual study load.

SCHOLARSHIPS

There are some scholarships at ECU that require you to make your scholarship application at the same time as you apply for your course of interest. These include Year 12 high school leaver, undergraduate and postgraduate scholarships.

YEAR 12 SCHOOL LEAVER SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships are available to Year 12 school leavers who plan to study at ECU. These are awarded based on academic merit and/or commitment, and are designed to help with some of the costs of university education.

STUDENT EQUITY, DIVERSITY AND DISABILITY SERVICES

The Equity, Diversity and Disability Service provides support to students with diverse study needs, including those with temporary or permanent disabilities or medical conditions, or who care for a family member in that situation, those whose cultural or religious practices may impact on course requirements, and others in specific circumstances on a case-by-case basis.

This support may include:

- Liaison with academic staff about any potential barriers a student may face and any reasonable adjustments that may be required.
- Alternative format study materials.
- Alternative assessment and examination conditions.
- Access to a range of assistive equipment, software and technology.
- Provision of note-takers, scribes or Auslan interpreters.
- Library assistance.

Since graduating with a Bachelor of Contemporary Arts and an Aboriginal Theatre degree, Karla has worked in almost every remote community in WA, running dance and performance workshops at schools. She regularly supports and encourages youth, commissioning new Noongar performance pieces and events, and facilitates workshops across the state.

"This means so much to me, for my country, people and my family, especially all my Noongar people. It's a responsibility of mine to go forth and take all the opportunities my grandma never had," she said.
