Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) 2021 Report



What is the Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF)?

In 2011, the Australian Parliament passed the Higher Education Legislation Amendment (Student Services and Amenities) Bill 2011 to allow universities and other higher education providers to charge a compulsory Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) from 2012. Under the legislation, universities may charge an annual SSAF up to the maximum amount prescribed in the legislation and indexed each year

What can SSAF revenue be spent on?

SSAF revenue is allocated entirely to the provision of student services and amenities. The Commonwealth legislation prescribes a list of categories upon which the funds are to be spent.

The University is ultimately accountable for expenditure of the SSAF revenue. In consultation conducted with students and representatives of the student body, the best methods for providing amenities and services to enhance the ECU student experience are agreed. As a result, a significant amount of amenities and services are provided by the Student Guild (which receive 50% of overall SSAF funding), others by the University itself.

Who decides how to spend ECU's SSAF income?

An Advisory Forum provides advice to the Vice-Chancellor and the University Council on the services and amenities that are proposed to be provided to ECU students with the SSAF revenue. Membership of the Committee includes undergraduate, postgraduate and international student representatives nominated by the ECU Student Guild, a student member of Council, and senior officers of the University.

Early in each year, the Committee drafts priorities for expenditure of the SSAF income, which are published for feedback from students prior to finalisation.

What is this report about?

SSAF funds complement other funds that are dedicated by the University to the provision of amenities and services. This report provides an overview of the services and amenities that were funded in whole or in significant part by the SSAF during 2021. It does not, therefore, describe all of the amenities and services that are available to students at ECU.

The headings in the report are the permissible expenditure categories from the Commonwealth legislation.

How much SSAF was collected in 2021?

The estimated ECU SSAF Allocation in 2021 was \$4,200,000. The actual SSAF income received in 2021 was \$4,070,000.

How was SSAF spent in 2021?

A summary of the 2021 actual expenditure against the approved 2021 SSAF Expenditure Plan is provided in the following table:
