Associate Professor Hadrian Djajadikerta Associate Dean Research School of Business and Law Systems theory is the study of how systems work. A wide array of concepts such as holism, open systems, lean systems, emergence and complex adaptive systems have been used in systems theory research but the study of systems is still seen as a niche field. As practitioners, we talk about and develop systems every day but we rarely discuss the nature of systems. This talk will explain the application of systems concepts in relation to a number of case studies including electronic health records adoption, national systems of innovation, and corporate social media use. The aim of the talk is to demonstrate how systems concepts can be used to frame research perspectives that have relevance for managers.

Professor Craig Standing is Foundation Professor of Strategic Information Management at the School of Business and Law. His research interests include national innovation strategies and the use of ICT to support organisational innovation. Craig has been the reciepient of ARC Linkage and Discovery grants and was a member of the ARC College of Experts between 2011 and 2013. He collaborates on research projects with members of the Centre for Innovative Practice and international academics from the UK, Denmark and Finland.
