#### [Dr Charles Hampden-Turner](#)

is a management philosopher and the creator of Dilemma Theory. A graduate from the University of Cambridge and Harvard University, he is a co-founder of Tompenaars-Hampden-Turner Consulting, an Amsterdam based consultancy in cross-cultural communication which is now part of the KPMG International People & Change Practice. Charles has published more than 20 books including Maps of the Mind, Riding the Waves of Culture, and recently, Nine Visions of Capitalism: Unlocking the Meaning of Wealth Creation. In 2001, he was included in the Financial Times World Business Thinkers list. He has consulted for major organisations including Motorola, Royal Dutch Shell, Advanced Micro Devices, British Telecom, Applied Materials, General Motors, British Airways, TRW, Unilever, IBM, Linde and Rockwell Automation.

#### [Professor Pi-Shen Seet](#)

is a Professor of Entrepreneurship and Innovation at Edith Cowan University's School of Business and Law. Having graduated from Oxford University with a degree in philosophy, politics and economics, he went onto complete his doctorate at the Judge Business School, University of Cambridge. Pi-Shen has held positions at Flinders University and the University of Adelaide. He researches in the areas of entrepreneurship, innovation, international business and human resource management. He is leading an industry project funded by the National Centre for Vocational Education Research to examine the impact of disruptive technologies on skills and training in Australia. He has consulted for start-ups, social enterprises and SMEs with business planning and development with firms like DCM Design, Tier5 and non-profits like Zoos SA.

#### [Professor Kerry Brown](#)

is a Professor of Employment and Industry in the School of Business and Law at Edith Cowan University. She is a Program Leader for the Governance and Organisational Planning Program of the Asset Institute. Kerry is the Executive Board Member and Founding Fellow of the International Society for Engineering Asset Management, and a Research Fellow in the Australia and New Zealand Academy of Management (ANZAM). Kerry researches in the areas of change management, collaboration networks and business clusters, management and policy for infrastructure and asset management, and government-business-community relations. Active in industry-sponsored research, Kerry has been engaged in projects related to policy and work organisation, development and strategy, public and social policy, management and evaluation. She has consulted for the City of Albany, the Department of Communities under the Queensland State Government, and Connecting Southern Gold Coast.
